## **COUNCIL** HONOURED WITH AWARD

The Saskatchewan Safety Council was honoured with the **Better Business Bureau** of Saskatchewan's 2015 **Torch Award** for Outstanding Ethics and Integrity in Business for a Nonprofit Organization. The award is designed to recognize the actions of businesses that display ethical business decision-making and integrity in business practices resulting in a positive impact in our communities. The Council was anonymously nominated for the award which it had previously won in 2009.

The Council was notified that they were a finalist for the award but the winner was not revealed until the award was presented. Chief Executive Officer, Ryan Jacobson accepted the award on behalf of the Saskatchewan Safety Council with a large delegation of the staff team in attendance, along with newly appointed President, Jeff Peters. "When I found out that we were a finalist, I made sure that we bought enough tickets for all full-time staff to attend the awards banquet," said Jacobson, " it was important for the whole team to participate in the event and to realize that the effort each and every one of them has put into our client services is noticed, appreciated and recognized throughout the province".

## **1955-2015** 60 YEAR ANNIVERSARY

On December 10th, 2015 the Saskatchewan Safety Council hosted a 60 year celebration lunch in appreciation of members, partners and stakeholders in combination with the annual holiday lunch.

Jeff Peters, President of the Board of Directors addressed the over 150 quests in attendance. The speech encapsulated the formation of the Saskatchewan Safety Council on November 15th, 1955; the vision of the founding partners to create a public, voluntary organization that would be controlled by a partnership of private businesses, government representation and individuals; and many of the key milestones and highlights from across the decades.

Through the dozens of programs that have been provided by the dedicated staff, volunteers and partners of the Saskatchewan Safety Council, thousands of lives throughout the province have been forever impacted.

A large history project was begun in 2015 that will carry on into future years that aims to preserve, organize and showcase the incredible history of the Saskatchewan Safety Council.



## **STRATEGIC PRIORITIES**

With the approval of the first Strategic Plan the year prior, 2015 required an alignment of resources, work plans and targets to reflect the affirmed priorities. The five currently approved priorities are:

- 1. Be the Central Source for Safety Information in Saskatchewan.
- 2. Increase Advocacy and Outreach across the province.
- 3. Expand Provincial Training Reach.
- 4. Focus on Partnership Strength and Maintenance.
- 5 Enhance Membership Value.

With these priorities top of mind the work began. The Council invested in a new website with increased functionality that will allow for connections to social media and sharing of safety resources. Noticable presence in rural communities throughout the province was expanded through training opportunities offered in more than three dozen communities, billboards in 7 major centres and more than thirty news stories. Staff worked with industry experts to develop and launch two television commercials that ran throughout the province for 6 months of the year.

Staff increased their professional

development opportunities to ensure skill sets continued to be invested in.

Program Coordinators doubled the offerings of sponsored safety training sessions for seniors in more than 20 communities and held sponsored training for youth in 35 communities across the province including 4 First Nations.



The Board of Directors approved the business plan for the development of the Online Agriculture Training System and development work immediately began to ensure the program would be available before the spring season of 2016.

Knowing well the difficulties faced by small charities the Council offered free safety training to local based charities

and significant discounts to small nonprofits. In addition staff extended resources to partners within the injury prevention cause to ensure their success such as leading the planning of the first Steps for Life walk in Regina and ongoing assistance with North American Occupational Safety and Health week activities.

## YOUTH SAFETY

#### **Early Safety Training Program**

2015 was another extremely successful year for the Early Safety Training Program seeing expansion in participation, geographic areas and sponsorship dollars. Overall youth engagement saw an increase of over 240%. This represents over 1230 days of training, almost 10,000 hours, provided to youth in Saskatchewan at no cost using the three options of; the self-study bursary; the in class curricula fitted model; and the weekend Boot Camps. This training was conducted in 25 different communities across the province including three First Nations.



#### **Youth Safety Summit**

The first annual Youth Education Safety Summit (YESS) was held on February 4th, 2015. The Saskatchewan Safety Council organized and sponsored the event which saw more than 20 organizations gather together for the purpose of enhancing the provincial environment of sharing and collaboration surrounding youth safety programming.

Three main outcomes were achieved:

- 1. An opportunity was created for organizations with a vested interest in youth safety to network
- 2. An inventory of programs was started to further share programs available within the province
- 3. Areas for working together were identified around the sharing of best practices and resources

#### **Amazing Safety Quest**



A new youth focused program was launched in 2015 known as the Amazing Safety Quest. This program is designed as a station based obstacle course focusing on learning safe behaviours through the power of observation.

Youth observe safe behaviours at each station and then demonstrate the safe behaviours. 353 students between Regina and Saskatoon participated in its first year.



## **SENIORS** SAFETY

#### Mature Driver Refresher Course

The Mature Driver Refresher course (55 Alive) continued to be popular in rural Saskatchewan. Staff worked diligently to ensure that training was available in as many communities as possible. With the support of our sponsors and community partners we were able to have 452 drivers participate in the training in courses that were scheduled in 25 communities across the province at no cost to the participant.



#### **Home Fall Prevention**

The Home Fall Prevention Program continued to be an important advocacy focus. Through attendance at trade shows and community events staff were able to discuss the important subject with hundreds of families.

The resource brochure continued to be in popular demand from community groups, health care centres and families as over 3,000 were send out.

Numerous meetings were held with partnering organizations to begin discussions about expanding seniors safety initatives across the province.



Online advocacy became a new tool that was used to reach large segments of the population with important messaging. Programs such as Facebook have enabled our advocacy to reach highly targeted, large segments of the population.

The downloadable resources started be utilized more as well. The Saskatchewan Safety Council Home Fall Prevention web page provides links to a wide range of external fall prevention resources in the province. Plans were put in place to organize a Seniors Safety Summit in the fall of 2015, however the decision was made to reschedule the event until 2016 to ensure more organizations could attend.

## **AGRICULTURE** SAFETY

The Saskatchewan Safety Council held to our tradition of being an active safety advocate for agriculture. Through attendance at major agriculture shows such as Farm Progress and Agribition staff were able to talk to many thousands of people about safety on the farm.

We also distributed hundreds of the childrens Farm Safety Activity Book that was originally developed as part of the Farm Safety Team and continues to be a popular item for families with young children.

A plan was approved in 2015 for the Council's long history of agriculture safety to continue by starting the single largest project ever taken on by the organization. Noting many barriers for agriculture families and workers to receive safety education, the Board of Directors approved and extended budget for the creation of the Online Agriculture Training System (OATS).



OATS is an interactive, online agriculture general safety orientation. The program will launch in early 2016 and be free for the participant. The costs of the program will be supported with sponsorships, eliminating the barrier of affordability. The program is designed to run off internet speeds capable on 3G mobile networks eliminating the barrier of accessibility.

## TRAFFIC SAFETY

#### **Skid Smart Collision Avoidance goes to Humboldt**

The Skid Smart Collision Avoidance course saw another successful year in 2015. Hundreds of people were able to participate in the open registration program.

A partnership was formed with Discovery Ford in Humboldt, SK that allowed this course to be offered in Humboldt for the



first time. Discovery Ford allowed the use of their property to build the ice pad, supplied snow clearing service and arranged for the space to be flooded to create the ice. The course was also featured by local media.

The motorcycle training program continued to be successful offering vital training to hundreds of participants. The partnership with the RCMP Depot Division that allows the course to take place on the closed course track has added great benefit to the participants experience. The passion and expertise of the amazing instructors ensures that many collisions and injuries are prevented every year because of the work done through this program.



## **OCCUPATION SAFETY**

With dozens of occupation themed programs available, thousands of participants were able to refresh or increase their knowledge about safe choices at work through our occupation focused programs.

The challenges seen in the Saskatchewan economy were reflected on many programs that were affected by decreased enrolment rates compared to the previous two years. Overall, the diversity of programs offered helped to offset some of the drop in enrolment.

A new Saskatchewan based Ground Disturbance program was launched in partnership with the Heavy Construction Safety Association of Saskatchewan. With the agreement between the two organizations we aligned our course curriculum, manuals, and presentations so that participants are able to access a new Saskatchewan standardized Ground Disturbance Level One and Ground Disturbance Level Two training at either organization.

Enrolment in Powered Mobile Equipment Operator and Instructor training continued to be strong for various types of equipment including Forklift, Aerial Work Platform, Skid Steer and Agriculture Tractors. Other popular courses included Work Zone Traffic Accommodation Supervisor, Flag Person Training, Fall Protection, Fire Extinguisher training, among many others.

The 5s consulting program that began in 2011, continued to offer various presentations throughout the year to assist organizations in improving workplace efficiencies. With most larger projects complete, new clients received the benefit of on site consulting with our experienced staff.

The 42<sup>nd</sup> annual Industrial Safety Seminar, held February 2<sup>nd</sup>, 3<sup>rd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup>, 2015 in Regina was a great success. A record number of display spaces were filled, with 105 booths. 684 registered delegates were able to investigate the many expert displayers to learn about the newest products and services available.


24 professional development presentations were held over the 3 day seminar including 4 keynote sessions. The keynotes featured Eldeen Pozniak, Past President of the CSSE and incoming President of the International Network of Safety and Health Professionals; Gary Anaka, author and leading presenter of Neuroscientific reseach on brain wellness; Greg Johnson, one of North America's top professional storm chasers and severe weather experts starring in his television show Tornado Hunters, and Carl Dixon, renowned vocal artist and band member with The Guess Who, April Wine and Coney Hatch that suffered a severe life altering vehilce collision.

## **ADVOCACY** & COMMUNICATIONS

Advocacy and communications were a significant focus of activity in 2015. A new website was unveiled in January along with the first of two television commercials that ran on CTV throughout Saskatchewan. The television commercials aimed to raise awareness of the Saskatchewan Safety Council and the important work it has done and continues to do throughout the province. The two commercials ran for 6 months of the year generating a reported reach of 9,527,600.

Messaging continued with local billboards that ran throughout the year in Moose Jaw, Prince Albert, North



Battleford, Regina, Saskatoon, Weyburn and Yorkton. 12 digital billboards also ran throughout the province in such places as the Regina Airport baggage carousel.

Reaching people with injury prevention messaging through social media continued to be a strong focus. Throughout the year Facebook had a total reach of 562,148 with 1,056 people that Liked the Saskatchewan Safety Council page. Twitter had an additional reach of 92,186 with 272 people following that account.





## **LOOKING AHEAD**

The Saskatchewan Safety Council continues to strive forward in our 60 year journey of changing attitudes and beliefs that surround injury prevention. Noting the progress we collectively have made since starting this journey in 1955 and reviewing the incredible work that has taken place to get us to where we are today confirms our knowledge that what we are doing is making a significant difference.

2016 will mark the start of a new decade for the Saskatchewan Safety Council. This time has yet to be written into our history and it is up to each one of us to make decisions that effect all of those that follow after. What we choose to do today becomes the history of tomorrow.

The Saskatchewan Safety Council is leading the way with the passion, expertise and resources to ensure that we collectively continue on the journey of injury prevention.

Guided by our strategic priorities we have invested in ground breaking programming into high risk areas to remove barriers of affordability and accessibility to safety education. We continue to build upon the success of existing programs, offering sponsored training in driver

safety to seniors in rural communities and providing thousands of hours of fully sponsored safety training to youth in their school system before they get their first job.


