PRESIDENT'S REPORT FOR 1984

It has been my distinct pleasure to act as your President for the past two years. I thank you for extending me this opportunity and providing support during my term of office.

In 1984, your Council has implemented a change of activity emphasis. The numbers of courses presented has increased dramatically. The Farm Division have completed preparation and distribution plans for the Farm Safety Program. The Occupational Division have placed a New Safety Audit Program on-line.

This increased activity has created additional revenues for the Council. The additional activity has also meant additional expenses. The ratio of revenue to expenses has been monitored very closely. Your executive is now confident that the Council's financial position will remain healthy, if managed carefully.

Your Board of Directors have met four times in 1984. The Executive met formally eight times during the term. Directors and Executives represented the Council to other organizations, committees, and conferences, on many occasions. All divisions have been actively meeting. Constructive plans and programs are being generated.

To all Division members, Directors, and Executive, I extend many thanks for your assistance and congratulations on a job well done.

A heartfelt thank you also goes to the Executive Director and the Council staff. The expertise and professionalism of this group is now starting to be recognized.

Although we have come a long way in the past year, there is still a long way to go. We must redefine the Safety Council's mission to assure we know what our objectives are. With a clearly defined horizon and the dedications shown in the past year, we can provide a greatly needed safety influence to the citizens of Saskatchewan.

The Council also conducted a School Bus Driver's Roadeo in Regina with 18 drivers participating.

The Council organized and promoted a Safety Fair in Lloydminster in April, with funds made available by SGI.

Operation Lifesaver

The Council continued its promotion of this program designed to reduce fatalities, injuries and property damage resulting from railway/highway crossing accidents. In 1984 two formal presentations were made to groups, one film was donated to Saskatchewan Education Media Services, and four displays, promoting Operation Lifesaver along with other Council programs, were conducted. Seven film showings were conducted for driver educators.

Over ten thousand pamphlets and childrens activity books were distributed.

For the third year a Safe Driving Week promotion was held in co-operation with the Regina City Police. Drivers were followed. Safe, courteous drivers were presented with a certificate of merit. A total of 65 drivers were followed with 7 receiving a certificate of merit.

Council staff made 26 traffic related presentations to 600 students, and conducted numerous media interviews with various aspects of traffic safety.

Elmer, School Bus Safety, Fire Safety, Operation Lifesaver and Rowntree/McIntosh Halloween Safety materials were distributed to various schools throughout the province.

Council staff was also involved in giving numerous media interviews on various public safety topics and gave presentations to schools and service groups on Safe Grad, Fire Safety, Home Safety and Child Safety as well as serving on the Regina School Pedestrian Advisory Committee and the Regina Liason Committee.

OCCUPATION DIVISION REPORT

In 1984 the Occupation Division was active in a number of areas.

The Annual Industrial Safety Seminar continued to be the main activity of the division. The seminar was held in Saskatoon February 6th to 8th and attracted 286 delegates (a record number).

In addition to the Seminar, the division sponsored a Forklift Instructor's Course (5 graduates), a Forklift Operator's Course (6 graduates), a Fire Control School (17 graduates) and two Basic Industrial Safety Courses (65 graduates).

The division also began preliminary development of the Safety Audit Program for industry which will include an assessment of environmental conditions, work methods and all elements of an organization's accident prevention program.

FARM DIVISION REPORT

The Farm Division changed the format of the Farm Safety Course to video tape. Research was started early in the summer, and production of the program began later in the year. The course will be in nine segments:

Electrical Safety Machinery Safety First Aid Pesticide Safety Stress

Anhydrous Ammonia Vehicle Safety Annimal Safety Natural Gas Safety We participated in two farm shows: Farm Progress Show and Mexabition.

The staff was involved in a number of media interviews and the division met five times during the year.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

December 31, 1984

1. Significant Accounting Policies

i) Fixed Assets

Each fixed asset purchase costing more than \$200 is capitalized and depreicated on a straight line basis over the lesser of its useful life of five years.

ii) Safety Promotion and Research Projects - Development Costs

The council follows the policy of charging to current year's expenditure project development costs.

iii) Safety Promotion and Research Project Expenditures

Expenditures include only direct charges relating to the projects. With the exception of the Child Safety Committee where grant proceeds are received to fund salary expenditures of this project, salary and other administrative costs are reflected as general operating expenditures.

iv) Unearned Revenue

Unearned revenue represents the amount of cash received during the year in respect of film rentals for the portion of the rental periods extending beyond the fiscal year end, the amount of cash received for seminars to be conducted after year end and the amount of funding received for expenses to be incurred after the year end of research projects.

3. Funds Held in Trust

5. Grant Revenue

In 1984 the council received a grant from Saskatchewan Government Insurance (SGI) totalling \$105,500 (1983 - \$55,000) which is included in safety promotion and research projects. In 1983 an additional operating grant of \$10,000 was received from SGI. The Council also received a general operating grant of \$77,760 in 1984 from The Highway Traffic Board (1983 - \$77,760). In 1983 an additional grant toward safety promotion and research projects of \$8,232 was received from the Highway Traffic Board.

In addition to grants from provincial government agencies, grants were received for Safety Promotion projects from other sources totalling \$29,181 (1983 - \$26,866).
