He guided the Safety Council through some of its most trying times and was responsible for dozens of advocacy and training initiatives and partnerships that created the foundation for what the Safety Council is today.

Hundreds of thousands of people were, in some way, positively affected by Harley's work. It is safe to say that many people are alive today because of what Harley has accomplished. His name and legacy will live on through the people he worked with, organizations he influenced, and, most importantly, the people who made a choice to be safe.



It is very rewarding for me to be retiring and seeing such a bright future for injury prevention and in particular the Saskatchewan Safety Council. During my early days we had a staff of 3 and were, at times, financially strapped. Today the Council has a strong and dedicated full-time staff of 17, and a strong compliment of safety professionals working with us to promote the message of being safe.

STRATEGIC PLAN

For the past three years the Saskatchewan Safety Council has achieved consecutive record setting growth financially and in the number of people trained. Up to this point, the growth has been achieved with the resources that are currently available by focusing on increasing efficiency and utilizing the strength of dedicated staff. However, as growth continued, it was recognized that a new strategic plan, built off of a list of strategic priorities, was required to facilitate the growth.



The Council is a well-respected organization that has shown it can affect change.

To create the list of strategic priorities. The Saskatchewan Safety Council, along with Wayne Hellquist from Future Quest Consulting, began gathering feedback from its members, key stakeholders, employees, and board members through online surveys unique to each group. Multiple staff focus group sessions were then held to further refine the information gathered. All of the information was analyzed and from that process five strategic priorities were developed to provide the strategic framework for the Saskatchewan Safety Council.

- 1. Be the Central Source for Safety Information in Saskatchewan
- 2. Increase Advocacy and Outreach across the province
- 3. Expand Provincial Training Reach
- 4. Focus on Partnership Strength and Maintenance
- 5. Enhance Membership Value

These strategic priorities, along with an Operations Plan, combined to form our larger strategic plan. The strategic plan is a living document meaning that it will be continuously assessed and updated as the needs and resources of the Safety Council evolve. Input from members, key stakeholders, staff and Board members will be gathered in a variety of ways to understand what the safety needs in Saskatchewan are and ensure that the strategic goals align with those needs. There are plans to follow up and further enhance the strategic plan, and the priorities that drive them, in 2015.

SENIOR SAFETY

One of the primary goals for 2014 was to increase the safety training and advocacy for the senior population of Saskatchewan and present it in an easily accessible and positive manner. The two objectives set out for this goal were:

- 1. Increase the number of Mature Driver Refresher courses and participants
- 2. Revitalize the Home Fall Prevention Program

Mature Driver Refresher Course

Not only did we exceed all of our training and advocacy goals set out at the beginning of the year, we also broke the record for number course participants in a single class and number of course participants in a single year. This was made possible by the hard work of the dedicated Program Coordinators who were supported by the increased marketing and communications resources that were procured and streamlined. During October and November, the Safety Council Mature Driver Refresher Course blitz held 22 courses in 20 communities. It was the most successful campaign ever for the course.

Here is a breakdown of our attendance increases over the last 3 years:

2012 - 13 sessions - 238 attendees

2013 - 15 sessions - 292 attendees

2014 - 35 sessions - 688 attendees

Due to the positive experiences and increased course awareness, we are now seeing a higher rate of calls and requests from participants and communities asking when we will be offering a course in their area. We made the best of our opportunity by soliciting feedback from each participant through a written survey. The response was an overwhelming success as every form indicated, on a scale of 1-5, either a great (4) or excellent (5) rating. We also had a large amount of positive written feedback about the course and instructors.

Home Fall Prevention Program

The Home Fall Prevention Program was revitalized to help adress the risk of injuries caused by falling in and around the home. Doing so allows seniors to stay injuryfree and maintain their independence longer. The goal of the Home Fall Prevention Program is to provide free resources created by the Saskatchewan Safety Council as well as sharing resources created by other organizations across the province so that families can make safety the right choice.


One senior's resource created by the Saskatchewan Safety Council was the Home Fall Prevention Checklist. Available in both brochure and digital form, it was created to address the need to provide an easy to use resource to help seniors identify the most common fall hazards in the different rooms of their home. It provides possible solutions for each hazard and encourages further investigation based on unique situations for each home.



The Saskatchewan Safety Council Home Fall Prevention web page provides links to a wide range of external fall prevention resources in the province. Some organizations, such as Forever...In Motion, promotes fall prevention through exercise programs that help maintain strength and balance. Others, such as One Step Ahead, will assess one's fear of falling and how it relates to risk.

TRAINING BY THE NUMBERS

It was another exceptional year for the Saskatchewan Safety Council's training programs. Approximately 13,000 students were trained in over 1000 courses in occupation, traffic, and community. A breakdown of how the courses were distributed among the three categories is shown below.





Motorcycle Training

The motorcycle training program had a very successful year for both marketing and student enrollment. The Basic Rider Training Course saw over 240 participants in 14 weekend courses. The program was advertised on billboards, in newspapers, and was represented on various local news programs.



There was a major improvement to training in several areas. First the numbers of students were up and interest is high. Being allowed to include the large 2.7 km track 3 in our training was a second. Where we already had the best training program in Canada it just got better. Riders are now averaging over 100 km/course and coming out with improved street skills.

This success is further emphasized due to the challenge of increasing insurance rates for motorcyclists. The cost of using a motorcycle became higher and therefore we needed to strongly reinforce the benefits of the course to show value in investing in proper training.

Early Safety Training Program

In its second year of operation, all of the program deliverables defined at the start of 2014 were met or exceeded. Overall youth engagement saw an increase of over 250% with 229 students receiving safety training in 17 different communities throughout the province, including one First Nation Reserve. This represented over 801 free training days provided to youth in Saskatchewan.

Over the last year, three charity golf tournaments were held to raise funds for training for the students of SE Cornerstone School Division, Prairie South School Division and Regina District Industry Education Council. These events raised over \$20,000 for youth safety training and provided opportunities to promote ESTP in the communities in which they were held. A media campaign was developed through Golden West Radio which saw over 60 radio ads run in each market. An insert was included in the September issue of the Chamber Link magazine which is distributed by the Regina Chamber of Commerce to 4,000 businesses.



Skid Smart: Collision Avoidance

Another successful year of Skid Smart brought 174 students through the course. This unique course was created by the Saskatchewan Safety Council, and provides information on the conditions that produce a skid and how to recover from them, focusing mainly on winter conditions.

The course has typically only been available in Regina, however at the end of 2014 plans were made to build a skid pad at Discovery Ford in Humboldt, making the course more accessible to Saskatchewan residents in 2015.

The Safety Council PME Instructor course is a multi-day course that can be tailored to fit the needs of any organization and can be done on-site.



INDUSTRIAL SAFETY SEMINAR

The 41st Annual Industrial Safety Seminar was held in Saskatoon on February 3, 4 and 5 with an impressive 787 delegates and 100 display booths representing approximately 80 companies attending this year's show. The exciting news was that it was the first year the Industrial Safety Seminar was held at a new venue -Prairieland Park. Prairieland Park provides us with the ability to continue to grow and keep our reputation as Western Canada's premier safety event. The response to the change was overwhelmingly positive! Displayers were extremely happy with the more open atmosphere and streamlined set up procedures. Delegates were pleased with the extra tables and space for networking with current and potential clients. Because of this move, we can continue to grow without sacrificing the displayer/delegate experience.

Delegates were able to attend presentations on a wide range of topics from speakers such as Tony Crow, Eldeen Pozniak, Gary McDougall, Joe Roberts, Dr. Todd Conklin, and Paul Pascoe. Jamie Clarke closed with his keynote presentation Above all Else: The Power of Passion.

The new facility provided an excellent opportunity to give the Safety Council a presence greater than any other year and put our key strengths and values in front of the displayers and delegates. A new Chief Executive Officer addressing the crowd brought a new face to the Safety Council and the video capabilities in the main hall were showcasing the Safety Council's organizational strengths.

This was the first step in a larger investment that will continue in 2015.

MARKETING & COMMUNICATIONS

In 2013 the Saskatchewan Safety Council made the decision to invest significantly in marketing and communication. During that year a Marketing Manager and Communications and Events Coordinator were hired to promote, guide, and maintain the Safety Council brand, programs, and advocacy campaigns based on the goals outlined in the previously mentioned strategic plan. By the time 2014 had started, the foundation was in place and the organization was ready to move ahead further.

Upgraded Website

The Saskatchewan Safety Council originally launched www.sasksafety.org as a way for people to find out more information about the events and courses offered to them. Since then, as the Safety Council has grown, so did the need for a more functional and future-proof website. In May of 2014, an RFP was sent to 19 web design studios to solicit proposals for the best solution. A few of the most important criteria were:

- Better organize our 60+ courses, advocacy campaigns, and events to facilitate our strategic goal for becoming the "safety hub" for Saskatchewan
- Be built to utilize web-based technologies to expand our reach as much as possible in the province of Saskatchewan
- Increase our membership base by providing value-added web-based incentives
- Provide better ways to collaborate with other organizations by adding more value to what we can offer

After careful consideration, Melcher Media and Design was chosen as the developer and construction for a new site began. By the end of 2014, the site was being tested and prepared for a January 2015 launch. The new website is now set up to accommodate the Safety Council as it grows and become the safety hub for the people of Saskatchewan. Visit the site today and see what's new!



Upgraded Visual Display

There was also a large investment into the Saskatchewan Safety Council visual display materials. The new items were first introduced at the booth display at the 2014 Industrial Safety Seminar. Large background stands, literature racks, and an event tent were among the new pieces of marketing that prominently showed the Safety Council brand, colours, and messaging. This gave a more professional and approachable presence to the Safety Council when attending external events.





Social Media

In 2013 the Safety Council launched a social media platform that consisted of Twitter and Facebook. With the groundwork laid, 2014 saw a heavier investment in the paid advertising of courses and advocacy. This was a critical element in our strategic priority to reach more people in the province. Some of the most popular courses and advocacy campaigns promoted on social media were:

Skid Smart
Mature Driver Refresher Course
Home Fall Prevention Program

Anti-drinking and driving messaging
Safety Tip of the Day (Twitter)
Emergency preparation
Industrial Safety Seminar

Targeted advertising allowed the ability to drive specific messaging to even the smallest areas of Saskatchewan which was previously very difficult to do. This was proven by the success of the previously mentioned Mature Driver Refresher Course blitz. The municipalities reached in this blitz were among the over 25 communities we contacted in 2014.

Other highlights from social media include:

- Gaining media attention at outlets such as CBC and CJME
- Gaining community feedback in the comment sections of Facebook Posts

Outdoor Media

The Saskatchewan Safety Council increased its marketing presence by further investing into current and new advertising spaces. Building off of the launch of its first billboard in 2013, the Council produced billboards and bus ads in the following areas:



The billboard creative direction was to produce simple and straightforward messaging so that the public could be exposed to the Safety Council logo and name and associate it with the programs and initiatives that were a priority at the time. Locations were chosen based on criteria such as high-incident areas and population density.










Community Engagement

Talking directly with the public is important to the Saskatchewan Safety Council as it helps give insight into the safety matters that concern them and helps us understand where training and advocacy focuses should be. This year there were steps made to use the new marketing materials to branch beyond events that focus on occupation and take root in more public events.

The Safety Council set up multiple times in the both the Cornwall Centre and Southland Mall. Using the non-profit space available, we engaged the public to promote our advocacy and training courses. We also used that opportunity to clarify certain perceptions towards the Safety Council. For example, many people believe that the Safety Council is a government organization so it was made sure that every person interacted with understood we were a non-profit charitable organization.





Video Production

In November of 2014, the Saskatchewan Safety Council invested in new video equipment including a digital video camera and a GoPro camera. The purpose was to start recording training footage and use it to promote them on the Safety Council website and YouTube channel. The first two courses that were recorded were Skid Smart: Collision Avoidance and PME Instructor training. These were chosen because they are courses that have unique attributes that set the Safety Council apart from other training organizations.

The PME Instructor course video showcases the Safety Council's most valuable training asset - the instructors. These instructors are some of the most knowledgeable and experienced trainers in the country and it is important that we help future clients understand that there is no sacrifice in training quality when working with a non-profit charity. Video was shot of the instructors working with the clients as well as GoPro footage of Rick Schwartz, Program Coordinator, demonstrating a clean run through the forklift course.

With Skid Smart: Collision Avoidance, video was taken to show the practical skills portion of the course because it is difficult to communicate what the benefits and value of the skid pad in words. Footage was taken with the GoPro from the hood of the vehicle (pictured below) as well as from the outside perspective with the digital video camera. There was also footage taken during the instructor refresher class to show the different types of exercises.

There will be more videos shot in 2015 that will be posted on YouTube and on www.sasksafety.org to add more depth to our course descriptions and promote our courses.



LOOKING AHEAD

When Harley Toupin retired from the Saskatchewan Safety Council, he left the organization in a strong position to grow for many generations to come. Newly appointed CEO, Ryan Jacobson, and the rest of the Safety Council staff are eager and ready to continue Harley's work and elevate the organization to a new level.

The investment in marketing and communications will continue to grow as the Safety Council works to expands its products, services, and advocacy to more communities in the province. Investments in new mediums such as television will bring a new perspective to the value of working with the Safety Council. Social media will continue to be a focus to allow messaging to be targeted at both the province as a whole and to specific groups. There will be an increase in attendance at community events to increase face-to-face communication as well.

A new Ground Disturbance course will be introduced in 2015 to add even more depth to course offerings. As well, the Safety Council will be promoting open registration courses through our new website at www.sasksafety.org. These courses will help accommodate small and medium sized businesses that do not require booking a full classroom. It will also help organizations that need to train someone on short notice.

The increase in demand for Saskatchewan Safety Council training and services requires changes internally to certain job tasks to increase efficiency and accommodate new internal administrative systems. This includes the possibility of hiring additional staff.

Going forward, the Safety Council will be guided by its strategic plan. It is collaborative effort by staff, Safety Council Members, and key stakeholders with the sole purpose of Working Together to Achieve a Safe Saskatchewan. As the safety needs at work and at home evolve, so too will the priorities that drive the strategic plan.

There are many more exciting plans for the coming year and beyond. The torch that Harley kept lit for 33 years is now burning as strong as ever and is moving forward with success. We look forward to carrying the torch with our Members and partners to help the people of Saskatchewan Make Safety the Right Choice.

Saskatchewan Safety Council Summarized Notes to Financial Statements For the year ended December 31, 2014

1. Incorporation

Saskatchewan Safety Council is incorporated pursuant to The Non-profit Corporations Act, 1995. The Council is a registered charity dedicated to preventing injuries and fatalities in the Province.

2. **Fund Balances**

The Unappropriated Fund balance is \$1,807,124 (2013 - \$1,813,519) which represents the accumulated excess of revenue over expenses of the Operating Fund, which has not been designated for specific purposes by resolution of the Board of Directors.

The Appropriated Fund balance consists of the accumulated balances of the Contingency Reserve and the Memorial and Other Donated Funds. The Contingency Reserve is for unforeseeable expenses. The objective of the reserve is to maintain a balance of at least \$200,000. Memorial and Other Donated Funds must be used for special research and safety program in injury prevention. Certain board members are appointed as trustees to administer these funds.

3. **Description of Funds**

Revenues and expenses related to program delivery, membership and administration activities are reported in the Operating Fund. Revenues and expenses related to restricted donations, special research and safety programs are reported in the appropriated funds.

4. Criteria used to prepare the Summarized Financial Statements

These summarized financial statements are prepared solely for inclusion in the Saskatchewan Safety Council's Annual Report, and have been derived from the audited financial statements for the year ended December 31, 2014.

These summarized financial statements include a summary of each of the statements from the audited financial statements in full form, except that note references have been removed. Most notes included in the audited financial statements have been removed, and only a summary of the Funds set up by Council is included to provide a general understanding of how Council manages its operations. These summarized financial statements are prepared using measurement criteria found in Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations, but do not follow the disclosure requirements therein.
